Our keynote speaker, Paula Liz, was an inspiration as she took us through her journey to becoming an art educator and a leader in diversity and inclusion. We had over 90 participants and were so pleased to have the Vermont theater teachers join us. We had glowing feedback to our amazing presenters. Barbara Paulson lead puppet making and performance workshops while Lisa Bresler guided groups through the joy of Gelli prints. Paul Gambill showcased community engagement through artist residencies while Jonathan Silverman brought together art making, movement, and poetry. Meghan Doherty shared a variety of needlefelting techniques while we all enjoyed the rare time to gather together and create and network.

# 2023 FALL CONFERENCE EMPOWERING VOICES AMPLIFYING BELONGING THE ARTISTIC JOURNEY



On Saturday, September 30th, we had the second part to our amazing conference with a workshop led by Chief Don Stevens. Chief Don Stevens is a leader of the Nulhegan Band of the Coosuk - Abenaki Nation and Executive Director of the tribal non-profit AHA-Abenaki Helping Abenaki, Inc. Our host was the Stone Valley Arts At Fox Hill in Poultney, Vermont. Teachers learned the significance of Wampum to Native Communities, what it is used for, and traditional uses of Wampum. Teachers also learned how to use Wampum for teaching native history in their classrooms and the differences between appropriation and appreciation. Chief Don Stevens shared many personal stories of his families having to hide and change names to avoid the eugenics sterilization, the fight for tribal recognition, the triumph of the return of the buffalo and the internal strife within their tribal community. While at Stone Valley Arts we also enjoyed the art show Art of the Creative Process where five artists as well as **Hubbardton Forge showcased the journey from** brainstorming and sketching to completed artwork. Participants spoke of how much they learned about Abenaki culture and having the opportunity to network.





# VERMONT ART EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR DEE CHRISTIE IN HER OWN WORDS...

"Teaching art hasn't always been my passion, but being involved in the arts has. I remember the only classes that grabbed my attention were the art classes, and if it were not for one art teacher in my high school career, my life could have gone in a different path. She told me I should go on to art school, and with her prompting, I pursued a career in Commercial Art. I loved the creative process, but felt I was missing something significant, so I went back to post grad and received my teacher 7-12 Art Education Certification. Then my Master's at St. Mike's for Arts Education, and focusing on At-Risk kids in the art room. I have always been drawn to students that struggle being in school, feeling like I could help them succeed in high school. I have found this to be true throughout my career, although I love all kinds of students and love to see when they succeed, regardless of how they come in my room. I have been teaching at Bellows Free Academy for my whole career of 35 years. I started as a part time teacher, and it quickly grew into a full time teacher.

Arts Integration has been intriguing to me as my teaching areer has continued, especially the past few years, when we have seen a higher drop out rate, higher needs, and our school moving toward flexible pathways, dual enrollment, and alternative options to reach competencies. My biggest attribute is getting students to see their talents, their worth and their future. I have made long lasting relationships with students that have carried on for my whole career. That is what makes my time teaching significant and worth every second. When I have a student reach out years after graduation and thank me means the most. Making a difference in someone's life that is remembered years later, whether I remember my gesture or not, it's the fact that they remember what is the big difference between being a good teacher and a great one."


